An Enduring Church in a Changing City

Little Trinity Church was built in 1843 as a neighbourhood church. By the middle of the 20th century the local industrial base had collapsed and many residents moved away from the increasingly derelict area. After an averted sale of the church property, the congregation began to rebuild with new members drawn from all over Toronto because of the evangelical focus of ministry.

At the end of the 20th century a major restoration of the neighbourhood began. The parish which had a total population of 5107 in 1981 is now predicted to grow to 40,000 or more by 2030. The changes are already underway with many homes already built and the three waterfront precincts, with 18,000 residential units, just beginning. There will be many new businesses, parks and cultural centres. We are privileged to be witnessing tremendous change in the history of our neighbourhood.

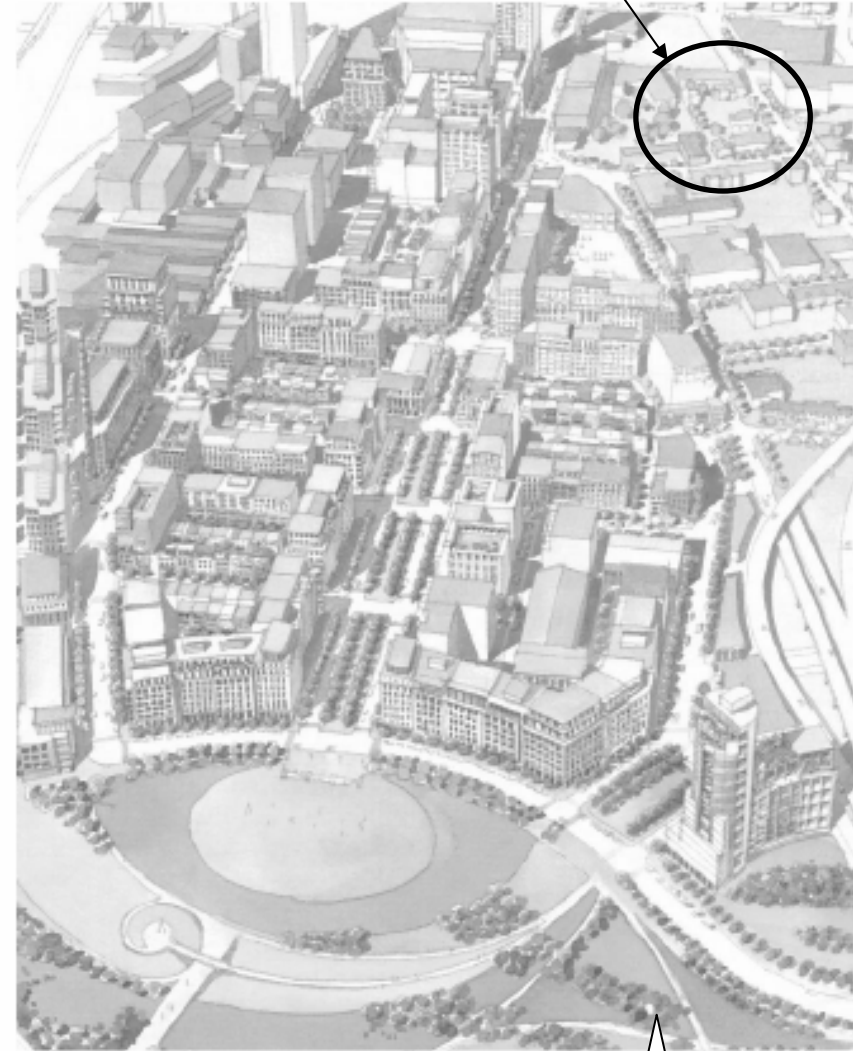
